

## **One Newport Public Services Board - Summary of Business: April and May 2017**

### **Assessment of Local Well-being**

The PSB agreed the final draft of the Local Well-being Assessment ([Community Well-being Profile: Newport 2017](#)) at its meeting on 25 April. The Assessment had been amended in the light of consultation responses.

### **Local Well-being Plan**

The PSB agreed proposals for developing the Newport Local Well-being Plan at its April meeting.

Once published in May 2018, the Well-being Plan will be the main work-plan and focus of the PSB, containing local objectives and the steps the PSB will take to meet them.

The PSB held workshops in May to begin developing the Plan. Members wanted the PSB and the Plan to be ambitious, serious about working in partnership, and firmly focused on people and outcomes.

At subsequent workshops, PSB members and wider partners prioritised issues for the plan to address in areas of environmental & cultural well-being, economic well-being and social well-being, taking account of the Community Well-being Profile, the seven well-being goals for Wales and the five ways of working (long-term; prevention; integration; collaboration; involvement) in the [Well-being of Future Generations \(Wales\) Act 2015 \(WFG Act\)](#).

Alongside PSB members, partners at the workshops were Newport Live, the Fairness Commission, Careers Wales, JobCentre Plus, schools representatives, South Wales Chamber of Commerce, Friars Walk, Federation of Small Businesses, Gwent Wildlife Trust, Living Levels Landscape Partnership, Pobl, Gwent Health & Social Care Transformation Team and Newport City Council service area specialists.

Future development of the Plan will include a public consultation in autumn in 2017.

### **Well-being Objectives**

Several partners on the PSB were required by the WFG Act to publish well-being objectives and a supporting well-being statement by 31<sup>st</sup> March 2017. The objectives must maximise each organisation's contribution to the seven well-being goals for Wales:

## Newport - Dementia Friendly City



In April the PSB agreed to come together to boost efforts to make Newport a dementia friendly city and include it as a priority work programme in the new Well-being Plan.

Some partners have already achieved or are seeking individual accreditation through the Alzheimer's Society scheme, but through closer working the aim is to improve services and understanding of the needs of those with dementia more quickly and consistently across the city.

One in 14 people over 65 years of age are reported to be living with dementia and the Alzheimer's Society estimates that by 2021 the number of people with the condition across Wales will increase by 31%. Over the last 12 months considerable progress has been made to raise awareness of dementia in Newport and encourage organisations to adopt dementia friendly practices and support people living with dementia and their carers.

Dementia Friends awareness sessions have increased understanding of dementia and what life is like for people living with it. Further sessions are planned across the city for anyone who wishes to take part. ### Communities First
